FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK

"In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, Favored one! The Lord is with you." But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be." Luke 2:26-29



How often our eyes skim through these verses as we read them? How often do our minds begin to wander as we hear them? It is the beginning of a story likely heard so many times over the course of our lives that it has begun to lose its meaning, a story told and re-told that may be difficult to experience anew. I will admit, it happens to me too. How can we find meaning in a story we know by rote? Where can we find something beautiful, powerful and true for us today?

Reading these verses, I found myself wondering about Mary's reaction to the arrival and proclamation of Gabriel; "But she was perplexed by his words...." God cares deeply for her. God is with her.

Putting ourselves in Mary's place in the story, we can appreciate that she would be confused for any number of reasons. I think the main source of her questioning is the source of our questioning – if God is with me, why can't I see God? Why don't I at all times experience God walking with me on the way? Why don't I always feel God is with me?

Mary, just like you and me, has spent her life hearing about a God who interacted with God's people, who liberated them from Egypt and exile, who spoke and interceded on their behalf, reacting to the cries of the oppressed. But Mary in her lifetime, has not experienced God in this way – a God who lives and breathes and speaks and moves in a plainly visible way.

And yet! An angel of God appears to her and speaks on God's behalf. Her confusion increases as she hears that she is to bear a child through the power of the Holy Spirit, a baby who will be called the Son of God.

We move from one extreme to another-a God who interacts with God's people, to a God who appears silent and distant, to a God who pitches a tent among us, dwelling with us in our own form. A God willing to take on vulnerability, the limitations and pain that come from being human in order to be in closer relationship with us. And Mary exclaims, "How can this be?" We nod and wonder, "How indeed Mary?" We are oddly resistant to Mary's later words, "Let it be according to your Word."

Mystery for us is something to be solved, fixed, or figured out. We struggle with mystery that is simply "unknowable." In our world today we find ourselves wanting more of the concrete things in life rather than those things that are not tangible. We find it difficult to wait. This is often propelled by consumerism and greed. We want Christmas now and when ADVENT, the time of intentional waiting before the birth of Jesus, is nowhere to be found. As well, we look at Mary and all those adjectives our tradition has ascribed to her such as favored and pure. And we may think that if I am not those things, then why would God come to me?

What does that mean for us common, everyday folk full of flaws and imperfections? Can God be in the daily realities of our lives, from the mundane to the difficult? Can there be birth, rebirth, new life moving in us and among us, individually and as a community of faith?

That, I believe, is part of the Advent season – waiting, wondering and watching. As we hear these old familiar stories being told, perhaps re-telling them ourselves, we sit and wait in the mystery of it all while catching glimpses of God in movement in our lives. We may wonder... if God has come to a poor young girl, a carpenter, some outcast shepherds on a hill, their sheep, kings of the East, a couple of cows and perhaps even a donkey, then maybe there is room in there for us too. Reach out to those who are lonely, sick or shut-in, say hello to a stranger as you walk about downtown, say hello and ask that person who is panhandling how they are, have a conversation with them... maybe buy them a hot coffee... take note and be thankful. We are indeed truly blessed.

May you and yours be filled with the Mystery and Wonder of that first Christmas!

The Band will continue to be very busy over the next few weeks leading up to Christmas and these will particularly memorable as the Band Director, Dr. Edsel Bonnell, has just recently tendered his resignation effective January 1, after 45 years with the Band. We all wish Edsel well in his retirement!

In October, while I was in Calgary, I took the opportunity to visit Hillhurst United Church, the home of Rev. Dr. John Pentland, who was here last summer. It was both inspirational and a rewarding visit. I gathered some material from them that we will be adapting for ourselves relating to our work in becoming an Affirming Congregation. You will be seeing and hearing more as a lead up to a special Congregation Meeting early in the New Year wherein we will be holding our vote.

The Warm and Dry fundraiser is going fairly well in that we have approximately \$80,000 committed of the \$150,000 goal. So we still have a ways to go.



WORTH NOTING

For the first time, one of the Gower Community Band's own members is an award-winning composer! Percussionist **Liam Robbins**, son of David Robbins and Kim Larouche, and grandson of Bernice and Claude Robbins, won a Silver Award from the Adjudicators for the Band's annual Terra Nova Program Composition Competition with his work "Overcast", a tone-poem inspired by our Newfoundland and Labrador weather! Liam also made his GCB conducting debut, wielding the baton for the Band's premiere performance of his work at the D.F. Cook Recital Hall at MUN's Music Building on October 28.





William Ping, son of William and Violet Ping, graduated with a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) at the Spring Convocation of Memorial University on October 20. William received a Chinese Association Scholarship several years ago and was a member of the Dean's List at the time of his graduation. He is currently working toward a Master of Arts degree in English at Memorial.

Susannah Mckenzie-Sutter, from the alto section of the Gower Choir, received a Master of Music degree at Memorial's Fall Convocation.



Marie Beth Wright has been appointed to the Standards for Accreditation Committee of the United Church of Canada's new Board of Vocation. This board and its committees represents the new governing structure of the National Church and will work in tandem with General Council. It comes into effect January 2019.

The Office of Vocation will be supported by this national-based Board of Vocation. In addition to Marie-Beth, the **Rev. Ettie Gordon-Murray** has been appointed to the Candidacy Board for the Atlantic Region. There will be two Western Regions, two others exclusive to Ontario, another encompassing Eastern Ontario and Québec and our own Atlantic Region, newly named, *First Dawn, Shining Waters Region*. In

addition, there is currently a provisional Indigenous Candidacy Board. The newly appointed Ministers of Vocation (in the Atlantic Region, the Rev. Faith March McCuish) will be responsible each for their own region.

The Standards for Accreditation committee will busy itself with preparation and training for ministry, accreditation points, policy and ethics; all in all, educational training and best practices to ordain and keep ministers in good standing. Other committees of the Board are Credentialing, Response and Remedial.

The makeup of the Board of Vocation and its committees is approximately 80% ordained members, 20% lay members. There are five representatives from Newfoundland/Labrador. Training occurred in Toronto in early November.

Revised Vision Statement:








REMEMBERING THE WOOLWORTHS ESCALATOR



POETRY CORNER

"Love Came Down at Christmas" by Christina Rossetti

Love came down at Christmas, Love all lovely, Love Divine, Love was born at Christmas, Star and Angels gave the sign. Worship we the Godhead, Love Incarnate, Love Divine, Worship we our Jesus, But wherewith for sacred sign? Love shall be our token, Love be yours and love be mine, Love to God and all men, Love for plea and gift and sign.



"Love Came Down at Christmas" was written by Christina Rosetti, and was first published without a title in *Time Flies: A Reading Diary* in 1885. It has been set to music as a Christmas carol by many composers and is sometimes sung to the traditional Irish melody "Garton". More recently, the poem was given a modern treatment by Christian band Jars of Clay on their 2007 album, *Christmas Songs*. It was repeated by the Trafalgar Square Christmas Tree on 11 December 2014. It has been described as "simple, direct and sincere", a rare example of a carol which has overcome the disadvantage of "not having a tune (or two or three) which has caught the imagination of holiday audiences."

A CHRISTMAS TRUCE - 1914



During World War I, on and around Christmas Day 1914, the sounds of rifles firing and shells exploding faded in a number of places along the Western Front in favor of holiday celebrations in the trenches and gestures of goodwill between enemies. Starting on Christmas Eve, many German and British troops sang Christmas carols to each other across the lines, and at certain points the Allied soldiers even heard brass bands joining the Germans in their joyous singing.

At the first light of dawn on Christmas Day, some German soldiers emerged from their

trenches and approached the Allied lines across no-man's-land, calling out "Merry Christmas" in their enemies' native tongues. At first, the Allied soldiers feared it was a trick, but seeing the Germans unarmed they climbed out of their trenches and shook hands with the enemy soldiers. The men exchanged presents of cigarettes and plum puddings and sang carols and songs. There was even a documented case of soldiers from opposing sides playing a good-natured game of soccer.

If you aren't already on PAR, the annual distribution of envelopes is an opportunity for you to consider it. Your annual contribution envelopes are ready to be picked up soon. There will be a package for current contributors and for those who decide to join PAR this year. Many of us use direct deposit in our personal lives...why not consider it for your church family this year.
