Georgina Stirling (1867-1935)

On Our Cover

Georgina Stirling was born in Twillingate on April 03, 1867, one of seven daughters and four sons of Ann Peyton and William Stirling. Her mother was a granddaughter of Magistrate John Peyton of Exploits and her father was a medical doctor, originally from Harbour Grace. Upon completing her schooling in Twillingate, Stirling studied music, both instrumental and voice, in Toronto, then studied voice in Paris. She performed in opera houses all over Europe and in the United States, as well as in Newfoundland, where she was the guest soloist at the official opening of Gower Street Methodist Church on October 04, 1896. At the morning service she sang "Hear Ye, O Israel" and at the evening service, "The Holy City". Her career took a downward turn after 1900, resulting, it has been claimed, from problems with her voice. She lived with one of her sisters in England until 1929, when she returned to Twillingate, where she remained until her death on April 23, 1935. An account of her life, The Nightingale of the North (1983), has been written by Amy Peyton of Gander, who is related to Stirling by marriage. Newfoundland-born opera soprano Tonia Cianciulli is currently working on a concert tour of Stirling's work, as well as an album of her songs and a new book on her life. Cianciulli, together with her accompanist, Jason Locke, performed several pieces from Stirling's repertoire at Gower on Sunday, August 19, with her grandfather, the Rev. Calvin Evans, providing spoken commentary.

FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK

If I were to ask you who, other than parents and other family members, has been a positive influence in your life, what would you say? Would it be a teacher, a sports coach, a neighbour, a minister?

Stella Burry was one such person in my life. As long as I can remember, Stella was someone with whom I was acquainted. My mother died when I was nine months old and I lived with my grandparents along with my father. I remember Stella being a frequent visitor in my grandparents' home and, of course, there was always a cup of tea. My dad remarried and we moved to a new house in the Churchill Square area. Again, Stella (always Miss Burry to me), was a frequent visitor. On one occasion, I remember answering the door and there she was. As I listened I realized that Stella was canvassing various homes looking for used clothing



for women who were in need. Her statement to my step-mother was, "Choose some of your nice things, not ones you would not wear any more yourself." In the early 1950s Stella approached my father telling him that she wanted to build a camp for children and youth. Stella was a person to whom no one I know of said "no". Dad, wanting to help, found a piece of land which Stella deemed suitable. It was at Shoe Cove (near Pouch Cove) then about a forty-minute drive from St. John's. I was ten years old the first time I attended camp and there, again, was Miss Burry.

Stella Burry was an imposing figure, close to six feet tall with extraordinarily large feet and although, we all knew she was not one with whom to argue, we also knew the deep kindness within. She sat at the end of one of the long wooden tables, teapot by her right hand and presided over each meal as she did with every element of the camp program. I loved it all, except maybe rest period for an hour after lunch when Miss Burry would come around to each cabin to make sure that we were all quiet, lying on our bunks, where we were supposed to be. Morning worship, lots of physical activity, including swimming in the nearby pond, setting tables, washing dishes, Bible study, campfire and vespers were all part of the day.

Stella Burry died in 1991 and I often wonder what she would think of what has become her legacy. It started at Emmanuel House as a home-away-from-home for young women coming to St. John's to find employment or for further education. Again, Stella was there to ensure the good behaviour and safety of these girls. Every time I go to the Hungry Heart Café, I think of her and how pleased she would be to see people enjoying each others' company, the good food prepared and served by persons who have been trained in one of the numerous programmes offered by Stella's Circle. The Inclusion Choir, also, would also give her joy.

Stella Burry lives on in those of us who were fortunate enough to have met and spent time with her. We are all richer by that connection as is the wider community. Stella gave us a sense of what is now called Social Justice based on a deep faith in God through Jesus. I'm sure that Stella would have resonated with these words: "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God?" Micah 6:8

Thank God for Stella Burry, for who she was and the lives she has influenced for good.



PERSONNEL CHANGES AT GOWER

She began work in late August on a part-time basis and has already began contacting and visiting members of the congregation who are incapacitated in some way. She has also met with individuals who are regularly visit sick and shut-in members.

Then, on September 16, a Congregational meeting approved the recommendation of the Ministerial Search Committee that the Rev. Pamela Jones-Fitzgerald be our minister designate, pending approval from the Newfoundland and Labrador Conference. She is scheduled to begin her ministry with us on November 05.

Lorraine served as a member at large on the Board for several years and chaired the Vision 2025 Implementation Committee. Len was a long-time member of the Outreach Committee. He also played a lead role in getting the tower clock working and wound it regularly. They both were very involved in arranging for accommodations and orientation for the Alsalamas, the refugee family from Syria that Gower sponsored into Canada. And, every week they picked up donations of food in the box in the main fover and delivered them to Bridges to Hope. At Coffee Time. Board Chair Lorne LeDrew expressed our heartfelt gratitude for their contributions to Gower and presented them

Helen Milley, formerly of Grand Bank, one-time resident of the Methodist College Home and for many years a resident of and teacher in St. Lambert, Quebec, is now enjoying retirement in St. John's. She first attended Gower while living at the College Home in the 1940s, and has made it her church home since returning to St. John's in 2013. She's been a subscriber of The Newfoundland Quarterly for many years; it is a magazine she says she "can't live without." Recently she named the winner of a Jean-Claude Roy painting: her name was selected in a random draw from all new and renewing subscribers to the magazine during the previous year. Roy is an avid supporter of *The* Newfoundland Quarterly and has been contributing his art work as prizes in the yearly subscription campaign for some time. Congratulations Helen!

Chesley Lambert, who has been a member of the Gower congregation for the past 90 years, recently celebrated a Gower milestone. September 12, 2018 was the 90th anniversary of his baptism here at Gower. Born on August 20, 1928 to Mildred Roberts and George Lambert at the family home at 103 Merrymeeting Road, he was baptized by the Rev. Dr. Wylie C. Clarke, and has been attending Gower ever since. Many happy returns!

The Rev. Calvin D. Evans, a retired United Church minister and university librarian, took part in the service at Gower on August 19. He provided contextual commentary on the musical pieces that his granddaughter, Tonia Evans Cianciulli, sang during the service. He pointed out that he had been a regular attendee of Gower during the late 1940s while attending Memorial University College. At that time, he had read scripture, was a Sunday School teacher and a member of the Young Peoples Union.

Emma Noseworthy, Brady Lawrence and **Peter Moore** were all employed at Gower this Summer on various government-funded student grants. Emma did general office work, transcription of vital statistics registers and bulletin collation. Brady assisted David Noseworthy in various projects that he was working on around the church and filled in for him part-time when he was on vacation. Peter, who also worked with us last summer, created a new display for the foyer, did work in the Archives and photo restoration and research for the *Gower Remembers* project. From July 21 to 27, Brady attended the 45th General Conference of the United Church of Canada in Oshawa, Ontario, as a youth delegate.



Margaret (Muggs) Tibbo is the newest member of the Newfoundland and Labrador Volunteer Hall of Fame. Her selection for membership in the Hall was announced on September 13 and she will be inducted on November 15. Muggs has been recognized for almost four decades of commitment to volunteerism, in particular with the Avalon Woodturners Guild, the Mission Staff for several Winter Paralympics, the Canadian Association for Disabled Skiing, the Rainbow Riders Therapeutic Riding, the Pearlgate Track and Field Club, Para Ice Hockey and Para Nordic Skiing with Cross Country. Her volunteerism includes such diverse activities as co-writing instruction manuals, modifying equipment, coaching and refereeing in a number of sports for persons with disabilities as

well as training others to be coaches and referees.

Andrew Dunsmore and Douglas Angel were two members of Gower who were featured in an article by Peter Jackson that appeared on CBC television on August 6. Andrew and Doug, along with Jessa Vokey, are all graduates of Memorial University's School of Music, who are now enrolled in Memorial's Faculty of Medicine. In the article, Andrew stated that "It was a family event that eventually brought him and his wife home. His father, beloved choral director Doug Dunsmore, was diagnosed with non-Hodgkins lymphoma. THE WENDY STEVENSON CHORAL BURSARY

Here we are at the beginning of another year at Gower. We have a lot to look forward to ... the building of a meaningful relationship with a new minister, new possibilities in outreach within the church, our local community and the United Church at large, and from our own point of view, a new year in which to lead the congregation through music.

It is always exciting to look at the many seasons of our church year with an eye to pairing meaningful music to enhance the worship experience.

The last few years have been especially satisfying thanks to the presence of our Choral Bursary recipients. An idea first made possible by the successful application to receive a one-time-grant from the Bruneau Centre of Excellence in Choral Music, we offered four Memorial University of Newfoundland Music students an opportunity to become part of the Gower Senior Choir. These singers served as section leaders and soloists and have successfully added a noticeable depth to our ability to prepare and lead beautiful music for our Sunday worship. As young people involved in the process of becoming professional musicians, they have helped breathe new life into the choir, rekindling much of the energy that can dissipate in a group over time.

So successful was this experiment, the choir began to work at ways to encourage funding for the continuation of the bursaries beyond the first year, through extra concerts and activities.

The whole project took on new life during the past two years when Carl Stevenson and his family made a concerted effort to fund the program substantially in loving memory of his wife, Wendy, one of our most stalwart sopranos. Since that time, the fund has received similar generous donations from the Hodder and Johnson families in memory of loved ones. Members of the congregation have also taken the opportunity to support the bursary program, now in its fourth year of existence.


It is a win-win situation! Music students get the opportunity to hone their craft performing significant music in a church setting while subsidizing some of their university expenses. Gower gets to reach out and help local musicians realize their potential. Gower members are also the recipients of an invigorated choir that will be able to provide effective choral leadership for many years to come.

The Nightingale of the North Returns

On Sunday, August 19, Tonia Evans Cianciulli returned to Gower Street United Church in the persona of Georgina Stirling. (Stirling had sung at both the morning and evening services of dedication for Gower Street Methodist Church on October 04, 1896.) Tonia first sang at Gower on Sunday, May 28, 2017, prior to the 11:00 a.m. service. At that time she performed pieces from Georgina's repertoire. This year she, along with her accompanist, pianist Jason Locke, and her grandfather, the Rev. Calvin D. Evans, as commentator, he delivered a musical sermon that reflected the depth and breadth of both Georgina's and Tonia's musical range and abilities. Prior to



the service, Tonia sang "O Mio Babbino Caro" by Puccinni, "Ombra Mai Fu" by Handel and "How Can I Keep from Singing" by Robert Lowry. Her musical sermon consisted of "Green Isle of Erin" by Clifton Bingham; "Rule Britannia", words by James Thomson and music by Thomas Arne; "Lead Kindly Light" by John Henry Newman; and "O Divine Redeemer" by Charles Gounod. She also provided a vocal postlude: "O Holy City", lyrics by Frederic Weatherly and music by Stephen Adams (Michael Maybrick).



Gower Affirm Update



Over the past months, the Gower Affirm Committee (Gail Wideman, Jill Handrigan, Larry Kelly) along with an advisory group (Daryl Pullman, Ken Peters, Barb Myles, the Rev. Florence Sanna, and Gola Roberts) have worked toward finalizing the steps outlined by the United Church of Canada toward becoming an Affirming Ministry.

These steps included:

• a revision of the vision statement to reflect our commitment to inclusion and full participation of people of all sexual orientations and gender identities — to be prepared and brought to the congregation

Update: with input from the April 29 meeting this was completed August 7, 2018 to be brought to the Board September 20, 2018

• an action plan that outlines our steps toward becoming an Affirming Ministry

Update: completed September 10, 2018 and sent for review by Affirm United, the action plan includes an education/awareness tool to be circulated to groups and committees for their ideas about ways in which their work can ensure inclusive practices, policies and programs; the action plan is a living document that will evolve under the guidance of an ongoing Gower Affirm committee

- the submission of documentation on completion of the above steps

 Update: as required by Affirm United the revised marriage policy,
 vision statement, and action plan have been submitted for their
 review; pending approval of Affirm United, a congregational vote
 has been tentatively planned for late September 2018
- a public celebration of our membership as an Affirming Ministry Update: to be planned for November 2018

We appreciate the opportunity to work with the Gower Street United Church community in the continuation of this journey honoring the diversity of God's creation and enabling each of us to bring our whole and authentic selves to our faith community. FROM THE ARCHIVES DO YOU KNOW...

...who is in this picture?



If you know any or all of the people in this picture, please write the names on a piece of paper and put it in the collection plate.

We find items for our Gower Archives in the strangest places. During the summer, David Noseworthy, our caretaker, was doing some work on one of the closets that are on either side of the stage in the Lecture Hall. He removed a wall covering and found an unopened bottle of Harvey's Communion Wine (probably from the 1950s); under a piece of flooring was a five centime French coin, with an image of Emperor Louis Napoleon III on one side and the date 1863 on the other; and when he removed the doorframe, written on the lintel in a bold hand, in pencil, was "William Roberts carpenter 29 July 1896". This was just a few months before the church opened on October 04, 1896. Each of these items is on display in one of the cabinets in the front lobby, but will eventually find a permanent home in the Gower Archives.
