The people of Gower Street United Church are committed to doing right by Jesus' teachings: loving, serving, giving generously in our local, regional, and global communities. We respectfully acknowledge the land on which we live, work and worship as the ancestral homelands of the Beothuk, whose culture has been lost forever and can never be recovered. We also acknowledge the island of Kaimuki (Newfoundland) as the unceded, traditional territory of the Beothuk and the Mi'kmaq. And we acknowledge Labrador as the traditional and ancestral homelands of the Innu of Nitassinan, the Inuit of Nunatsiavut, and the Inuit of NunatuKavut. We recognize all First Peoples who were here before us, those who live with us now, and the seven generations to come. As First Peoples have done since time immemorial, we strive to be responsible stewards of the land and respect the cultures, ceremonies, and traditions of all who call it home. As we open our hearts and minds to the past, we commit ourselves to working in a spirit of truth and reconciliation to make a better future for all.

Words of Welcome:

No matter who you are, where you come from, how you come to be here, what you believe or what you are questioning, you are welcome in fullness.

Gathering Words:

Come to the place of crucifixion, where Jesus is hanging on the cross. Beside Jesus hang those who are crucified today by society: by racism, by abuse, by injustice, by complacency.

We are aware of them, yet we keep our distance.

We do not want to come too close.

We do not want to get involved.

The place of crucifixion horrifies us, repels us, but will we turn and engage with its reality, as it was then and as it is now?

Gathering Prayer:

We come here today, O God, because we do not know what else to do. It is a holy day, because it is the day your son Jesus died on a cross.

It is a day that is hard to approach because brokenness and death are still hard to accept in our lives and our world.

Give us strength to be here with you today, O God,

so, we might come to know that, as you were with Jesus then, so you are with us still in our brokenness and the brokenness in the world. Amen.

Lenten Candle Liturgy: The Christ candle is lit.

On Christmas Eve, we lit a candle to celebrate the birth of Christ and the renewal it symbolized for the world. We rest in the glow of that candle now.

(a moment of silence)

As we relive and reflect upon the events of Jesus' death this day, we extinguish the Christ candle, just for today, to remind us that even in shadowed times such as this, death will not have the last word, these hard times will not last forever, there will be a new dawn.

Prayer Of Transformation:

God of infinite and vulnerable love whose body broken on the cross continues to confront us, today is Good Friday.

What is good about this day?

Jesus dies in agony because people reject his vision of your love for all of creation.

Jesus reaches out an open hand to all in need, yet we are threatened by his invitation to love one another as he loves us.

We experience his cry of anguish to you, his loving Parent.

So, what is good about this day?

Loving God, receive our question and open our hearts to your presence.

Reveal to us how an instrument of terror becomes a revelation of your love through the willingness of your son Jesus to embrace the anguish of suffering, to become fully one of us.

Free us from the bondage of our sin through Jesus' willingness to show such love through death on a cross.

Despite what we do to ourselves and one another, you, O God, are always with us, reaching out in love, showing us the way toward a deeper relationship with you, because today we know that we are worthy of being loved.

On this Good Friday, as we enter into the mystery of the cross, we remember that we are worthy of your love and we are worthy of being loved.

We commit to continue the path of faith, which leads to you, as together we pray: "Our Father, who art in heaven..."

Words of Assurance:

As Jesus said, "Forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

Amidst the suffering of the world, God always notices us and holds us close. Whatever we have done, willingly or unwillingly, through the gift of love that is grace, God forgives us. And as a forgiven people, let us celebrate in prayer our witness to the reign of Christ.

Prayers for the World and the Prayer of Jesus

There are days when we feel like crying out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Yet, even on those days, we can still express our heart's longing in prayer.

So, we pray to our God of love and hope by offering, **O God, receive our prayer.**

We sing: VU 948 O God, Hear My Prayer (bells then silence)

Loving God, you are the creator and the ruler of the universe, and yet you have chosen to appear in Jesus and suffer and die on the cross. **In Jesus, you experienced the sorrow and pain of living a human life here on earth.**

When we experience all the hardships of life, you are with us.

When we grieve at the injustices, you cry with us.

When we lose courage in the presence of hopelessness, you despair with us.

Remind us that you are indeed with us even as we want to cry in the nighttime of our fear: "Why have you forsaken me?" O God, receive our prayer.

O Jesus, we mourn with you as we witness you being crucified even to this day. We notice you sacrificed on the high altar of mighty profit. We notice you hanging on a tree of racism.

We witness you nailed to the cross of hatred. We witness you sleeping on the concrete pavement in the city of affluence. We notice your wounded body in the crowded emergency wards and desolate alleys. We notice you wounded and dying in war-torn countries.

O God, who suffered on the cross, how much longer will you simply cry with us? Instill in us a sense of hope and enough courage to act with compassion.

O God, receive our prayer.

O Holy Spirit, comfort our hearts as they mourn for the world that is not what we would like it to be. Nourish those who are hungry for food, for love, and for justice. Comfort those who are having a hard time with life.

Bring healing to those who are suffering from ill health and mental anguish, as well as those who live in spiritual emptiness.

May your indomitable spirit of life penetrate our hearts, our bodies, and our souls.

By our living, may we proclaim with confidence that you are alive and well in the universe. O God, receive our prayer.
